## Redeveloping Property – Bringing Life Back to Communities

- **Identifying distressed assets** – often vacant, mismanaged, or distressed properties that negatively impact the neighborhood
- **Creating a vision** – imagine the potential, create a plan, and envision how it can again serve the community
- **Securing the resources** – arranging financing, lining up contractors, and creating a budget
- **Renovation phase** – address structural issues, roofs, electrical/plumbing needs, cosmetic updates, and any code violations
- **Reintroduce** – returning the property back into housing stock through either sale or rental
- **Enhance the neighborhood** – improve curb appeal, reduce blight, and attract further private investment
- **Drive economic growth** – create good-paying jobs, purchase materials and services from area businesses, and stimulate prosperity in the community
- **Focus on people, not just buildings** – ensure the end result benefits residents, strengthens community pride, and builds a healthier local economy

# Redevelopment is a Team Effort

- Building a strong team is critical for success
- Real estate industry experts: agents, appraisers
- Financial partners: banks, lenders
- Legal & risk professionals: attorneys, insurance agents, title agents
- Skilled trades: contractors, plumbers, electricians, grounds contractors, engineers, surveyors

## Affordable Housing

## Workforce Housing

## Higher-End Housing

Attracts professionals, creates upward mobility, and encourages further investment in the community.

Together, these housing types ensure that every income bracket is served — creating a vibrant, diverse, and sustainable community.

Mixed Use | 22 Residential Units | Laundry  
Mat | Warehouse

Before:

- High vacancy and deferred maintenance.
- Multiple code and life safety violations.

After:

- Created additional clean, affordable, and safe housing stock.
- Improved neighborhood safety and property management response times.

The Elm Street project repositioned 22 residential units and improved safety.

## 5-Unit Multi Family

### Before:

- Distressed multi family building that had been vacant for many years.
- Changed hands many times with each owner starting work but never finishing.
- Required significant upgrades: plumbing, electrical, roof, exterior, and cosmetic updates.

### After:

- Providing housing for multiple families.
- Improved the look and feel of the neighborhood.

Redevelopment of 10 Spring Street converted a vacant distressed building into 5 housing units.

## Neighborhood Revitalization

### Before:

- Additional distressed & vacant properties along Spring Street.
- Many occupied properties had major deferred maintenance and life safety violations.

### After:

- Purchased 5 properties on the same block over 4 years.
- Drastically improved neighborhood presence and quality of life for residents.

Additional Spring Street properties were revitalized, improving the neighborhood's quality of life.

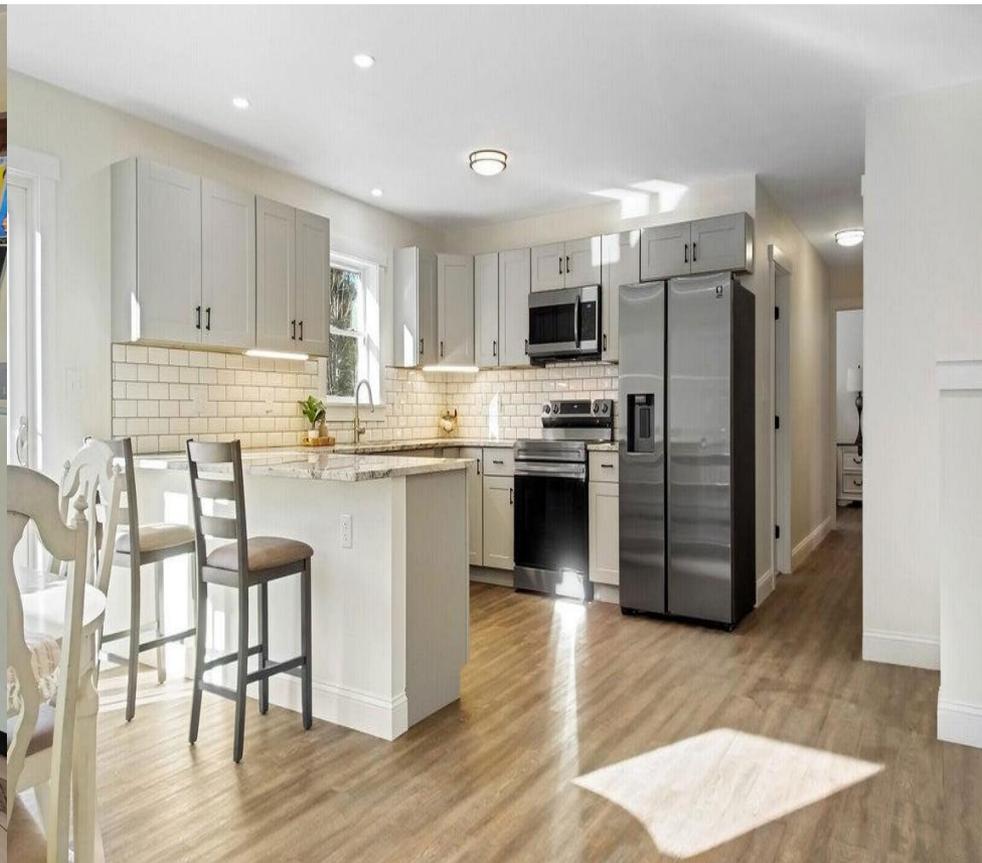
